The year 2022-23 witnessed the unfolding saga of the world's limping back to normalcy after the bleak COVID invasion of humanity in its totality and devastated and denormalized life in its entire sphere during 2020-22. Naturally, we feel to have a sour taste in our mouth as we talk of the progress made during the year under question and of the activities taken up within its span. It was really difficult for us - for every one-to carry on even the normal activities of life not to speak of taking up challenging activities which we prefer to face withstanding all our limitations. The imposed tenor of Do's and Donot's bothered us so that we got puzzled and bewildered to chalk out our course of action under the eventual red eyes of COVID. Even a report from the media that aspectre of COVID or a new

We could complete the activities in the sector of Child & Mother's care under the project IMPRINT with support from London School of Hygiene & Public Health. Dr. Nirmalya Mukherjee, Director, MANT, presented our performance report in London on the 7th day of February'23 to the full satisfaction of the School's authorities. The project on Human Rights assigned to us by the University of Gotenberg, Sweden was nearing completion leaving us with with petty undone.

Prof. Dr. Zulmer on behalf the Gotenberg University visited our place on 11th day of Nov'22 to take stock of our performance and presented his findings on 23rd day of Nov.'22, ahead of his leaving on that day, and appreciated our performance. He took the pains of visiting 25 numbers of tribal villages and talked with the villagers and graciously appraised his object of visit and the villagers' eager response convinced him that things had been on proper tracks.

Another event deserves mention. Dr. Rajshankar Ghosh from Gates Foundation, Delhi visited our palce for 3 days to get him acquainted with our field activities and visited our Radio Station, Handloom Centre and 10 tribal viallges and was so pleased that he offered to be with us in the coming days and see that other renowned Organizations come forward to espouse our cause after being briefed by him.

MANT took a momenrus decision this year to establish a Centre for Public Health Research (CPHR) in our Kolkata Office. This has created a ripple in the adminstrative circles of various esteemed universities and funding organizations, at the national and international level, and we have been getting request letters from them offering active collaboration.

This is really gratifying and MANT offers its grateful thanks to Dr.Nirmalya Mukherjee, Director, as the whole of it is his brain child.

Other programs continued as usual and as successfully as they are wont. I take this opportunity to expresss my love and greetings to all the staffs and the volunteers of MANT would made it possible for us to run the Organization as smoothly as possible. I wish them all the best and express our thanks to all the funding organizations that are and will be by us. Hope to see a more eventful 2023-24 and be it so.

MANT has spent a significant amount of time and effort focusing on tobacco control in west Bengal. Since 2014, we have been working closely with the Health and Family Welfare Samities of the West Bengal Government to run anti-smoking initiatives in the state of West Bengal.

These campaigns receive support from the South-East Asia Office of the International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease, which is in New Delhi.A case study on "Smoke-free Howrah" was featured in a WHO-published book titled The Power of Cities: Tackling Noncommunicable Diseases and Road Traffic Injuries, recognizing one of our efforts.

Howrah was the only city outside of Balanga, Philippines, to qualify among cities from around the world for outstanding achievements in making cities genuinely smoke-free. We collaborate with numerous training institutions, including the Administrative Training Institute, the West Bengal Judicial Academy, and the West Bengal State Police Academy, among others.



Enforcement Squad movement

We are members of the District Level Coordination Committee (DLCC), Monitoring District Level Committee (DLMC), and the District Level Enforcement Sauad (DLES) in each of West Bengal's twenty districts. In the state of West Bengal, we have organized more than different awareness campaigns. Almost 450 orders have been issued by various departments of the West Bengal government to ensure the smooth operation of tobacco control activities.

West Bengal has so far designated five districts smoke-free.The as Tobacco Vendor Licensing System has been introduced by Urban Local **Bodies** (ULBs) certain municipalities and municipal corporation areas. Police Training Programs were conducted with 24 Police Districts and Commissionerates. Police training programs were also held at Bhawani Bhawan and Lal Bazar.



A pilot project known as the Blue Line Campaign was initiated by us in conjunction with the Kolkata Municipal Corporation and five schools. In order to comply with the requirements of section 6 (b) of the Cigarette and Other Tobacco Products Act, 2003 we have drawn a blue line in 100 yards from the school border.

Now, the various district tobacco control cells in West Bengal have adopted it.We observe World Cancer Day on February 4th every year in partnership with the Saroj Gupta Cancer Centre & Research Institute and the Medica Super speciality hospital.

Additionally, we observe World No Tobacco Day on May 31st every year in collaboration with the Government of West Bengal.MANT has conducted numerous studies on tobacco-related maladies. tobacco taxation, tobacco consumption, smoke-less tobacco use, and bidi production, among others.



MANT has been running a cotton fabric and garments manufacturing unit (Prantik) in Purulia District since 2019. The social enterprise called Prantik led by women (mostly tribal), has been providing training and handholding support to 378 in number of artisans to produce handloom fabrics and garments. Last year we were in receipt of support under SFURTI Scheme from the Ministry of MSME, Government of India. And in this initiative we have collaboration with COHANDS of Ministry of Textile, Government of India. Under the support of the said scheme we have 94 looms and 20 tailoring machines (18 are electric and 2 are manual) which are placed in the Common Facility Center.

The Community Radio Station, Nityananda Janavani, usually airs programs both in Bengali and Santali for some 15 hours per day, the time span of broadcast being halved for each language. It, on principle, lays stress on issues that have particular relevance to the present living pattern and charts out a course that smells and assures of a better living ambience for wide the commonalty that constitutes its listenership. Last year's programs were not any exception to that

trend. Care was taken to address the problems that raised head in our day to day humble living in respect of health, agriculture, education, livelihood, water and sanitation and women and child care etc. Programs were presented in various formats—drama, interview, discussions/panel discussions, song rendition and recitation and the ilk. Jingles were intermittently used to hammer home a useful message with a sweetened context.

Meet The Team

UNICEF initially supported MANT's community radio station from 2010 until 2015. The radio station has the first Indian tribal radio jockey and broadcasts in Santhali and Bengali (with local dialect). The radio station has 11

producers, 4 jockeys, and 8 volunteers. The station also has a manager and assistant manager. Thus, 25 radio station employees. The broadcasting period starts at 6.00 am and lasts to 9.00 pm daily.

Purulia is characterized by a of media presence, lack resulting in minimal news coverage inside the region. A significant number of young from rural villages females participate in photography and videography programs within the region. Over time, individuals develop proficiency in capturing both photographs and films. They traverse various villages on bicycles for the purpose of filming. The individuals engage in a process of traversing many villages, whereupon they to showcase proceed their acquired knowledge newly through the creation and

dissemination of video content. Commencing from the shooting screenplay, the individuals possess knowledge regarding the essential factors to consider during the filming process. More than 100 videos are produced on a diverse range of subjects, including theatrical performances, short films, forum theater, and interviews, to raise awareness among the community people through the organization of village-level screenings. The videos produced by individuals receive significant recognition from both local residents and international audiences.
